The PublicSQL article in the October 2010 issue was interesting, and I'm sure readers would be interested to know that you can use the mozStorage API to write data to a local SQLite database. This gives SQLite an edge over PublicSQL – especially in contexts where users might want to harvest data from the web and store it locally. The limitation, of course, is that the mozStorage option is restricted to browsers built on the Mozilla engine, but many of us can live with that. A nice example of mozStorage and JavaScript in action is the Zotero Firefox extension. Details of the API are at <https://developer.mozilla.org/en/Storage>. Keep up the good work!

LM: Many of us on the US team are proud to trace our history back through the Unix system administration journal *Sys Admin*, which was founded by maverick publisher Robert Ward in

1992 and later acquired by CMP. You are correct that *Sys Admin* did market a CD with back issues. We don't know where to find it today or whether the CD is even still available.

Your letter illustrates the very important point that good, technical information has a remarkably long shelf life compared with other kinds of information you'll find in print periodicals. Many of the classic tools that Unix and Linux admins were working with eight years ago are still in use today: BIND, Sendmail, Apache, the Bash shell Although the versions have changed, the context, descriptions, and steps for getting started are often remarkably similar.
